The Complete Repertory offers an expanded repertorial framework that may improve individualized repertorial analysis.

Objective

To analyze acne-related rubrics available in the Complete Repertory and evaluate their utility in individualized homeopathic repertorization of teenage acne vulgaris.

INTRODUCTION

Acne vulgaris is a chronic inflammatory disorder of the pilosebaceous unit and remains one of the most common dermatological conditions during adolescence. It affects approximately 80–90% of teenagers and frequently involves the face, chest, shoulders, and upper back. Beyond its physical manifestations, acne may

adversely influence self-esteem, interpersonal relationships, academic performance, and overall quality of life.

In contemporary dermatology, acne is understood as a multifactorial disorder involving follicular hyperkeratinization, increased sebum production, microbial colonization, and inflammation. However, clinical presentation varies considerably among individuals with respect to lesion morphology, anatomical distribution, severity, hormonal influences, dietary aggravations, and post-inflammatory sequelae.

Homeopathy emphasizes individualized treatment based on the totality of characteristic symptoms rather than the diagnosis alone. Consequently, repertorization constitutes an essential step in remedy selection. The effectiveness of repertorial analysis depends upon the availability of precise and clinically meaningful rubrics capable of representing the patient's individuality.

Classical repertories such as Kent's Repertory, BBCR, Boger's Synoptic Key, Murphy's Repertory, and Synthesis contain numerous acne-related rubrics. The Complete Repertory, edited by Roger van Zandvoort, expands these entries by incorporating additional clinical descriptors related to morphology, anatomical location, constitutional characteristics, hormonal associations, etiological factors, modalities, and sequelae.

Despite this apparent repertorial expansion, published analytical reviews focusing specifically on acne vulgaris within the Complete Repertory remain scarce. This review therefore examines the organization of acne-related rubrics and discusses their potential utility in individualized repertorial analysis of teenage acne.

AIM

To evaluate the utility of acne-related rubrics in the Complete Repertory for individualized repertorial analysis of teenage acne vulgaris.

OBJECTIVES

RESULTS

A systematic review of acne-related entries in the Complete Repertory revealed a broad repertorial framework extending beyond the conventional diagnostic rubric "Acne." The rubrics were organized into seven clinically relevant domains: anatomical location, lesion morphology, etiological factors, hormonal associations, constitutional characteristics, associated conditions, and sequelae (Table 2).

The largest proportion of rubrics described **morphological characteristics** and **anatomical localization**, followed by etiological and hormonal qualifiers. Compared with a single diagnostic rubric, these expanded descriptors provide greater opportunity to individualize repertorial analysis by incorporating clinically characteristic features of teenage acne.

Acne vulgaris demonstrates considerable clinical diversity. Two teenagers with the same dermatological diagnosis may differ substantially in lesion morphology, anatomical distribution, aggravating factors, constitutional features, and associated complaints. Consequently, repertorization based solely on the rubric "Acne" may fail to capture clinically significant individual characteristics.

The present review suggests that the Complete Repertory provides a more detailed repertorial framework by incorporating rubrics describing lesion morphology, precise anatomical localization, hormonal influences, etiological factors, constitutional characteristics, and post-inflammatory sequelae. Such refinement allows the physician to construct a repertorial totality that more closely reflects the individual patient's presentation.

For example, a teenager presenting with papulopustular acne over the forehead, aggravated before menstruation and associated with oily skin, may be represented through a combination of morphological, anatomical, hormonal, and constitutional rubrics rather than a single disease rubric. This approach is consistent with the classical homeopathic principle of individualization.

Another notable feature is the inclusion of rubrics related to dietary aggravations, cosmetics, pregnancy, oral contraceptives, and certain medications. These entries acknowledge factors commonly encountered in contemporary clinical practice and provide additional repertorial options during case analysis.

It is important to emphasize that this review evaluates **repertorial organization** rather than **clinical effectiveness**. The presence of additional rubrics should not be interpreted as evidence of superior therapeutic outcomes. Prospective clinical studies are required to determine whether expanded rubric selection improves repertorial decision-making and patient outcomes.

CLINICAL IMPLICATIONS

The expanded repertorial structure of the Complete Repertory may offer several practical advantages:

- Facilitates selection of characteristic rather than purely diagnostic rubrics.
- Encourages individualized repertorial analysis.
- Integrates lesion morphology with constitutional prescribing.
- Improves repertorial teaching for undergraduate and postgraduate students.
- Provides a systematic framework for clinical case documentation.

LIMITATIONS

Additionally, the exclusivity of individual rubrics within the Complete Repertory was not determined through exhaustive comparison with every classical repertory and therefore should not be assumed.

FUTURE DIRECTIONS

Future investigations should focus on:

- Comparative analysis of acne rubrics across major homeopathic repertories.
- Clinical studies evaluating the impact of expanded rubric selection on repertorial decision-making.
- Development of standardized acne repertorization protocols for educational and clinical use.
- Integration of digital repertory tools to facilitate rapid retrieval of acne-specific rubrics.

The Complete Repertory contains a comprehensive collection of acne-related rubrics encompassing lesion morphology, anatomical distribution, etiological factors, hormonal associations, constitutional characteristics, associated conditions, and sequelae. This expanded repertorial organization may support more individualized case analysis in teenage acne vulgaris by enabling selection of rubrics that more accurately represent the patient's characteristic symptom picture. While these findings highlight the educational and practical value of the Complete Repertory, further comparative repertorial studies and prospective clinical research are required to determine their impact on repertorial decision-making and clinical practice.
